Why Save Dogs and Cats?

The Bad News is that Georgia is a high kill state. We have low spay/neuter rates, which creates a serious homeless and abandoned animal problem.

The Mixed News is that rescues come from other states, like missionaries, to save our dogs and cats and find homes for them somewhere else.

The Good News is that **Georgia rescue groups** work around the clock to try to get people to spay and neuter and to save dogs and cats and find homes for them. **Some shelters in Georgia** are committing to doing all they can to keep from euthanizing animals. **Some local governments** are promoting spay/neuter programs and helping shelters become **places of hope rather than death.**



How we treat creatures that depend on us for help to survive and thrive says everything about the kind of people we are. Abraham Lincoln said, "I care not much for a man's religion whose dog and cat are not the better for it." Dogs and cats enrich lives with love and comfort and beg only our protection in return. NGAA: Our Work

Here are some numbers to help give you a picture of the work we do. Last year, we...

- > Took in 1088 animals
- > Adopted out 433 cats and dogs
- > Transferred 510 animals to other rescues
- > Paid to have 483 animals spayed/neutered
- > Paid for vet care for 532 animals
- > Had 244 community cats spayed or neutered, vaccinated and returned to their caretakers

The numbers for this year are still adding up.

Rescue Work is all about People With a Heart to Help

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Mocha: A Love Story

I was at work when I got a text from NGAA. There was an old, aggressive cat at a shelter. She was hissing and had something wrong with her mouth. She had **30 minutes to live**, because she was slated to be euthanized.

My husband and I had recently lost our 18-year-old cat, so maybe I was feeling vulnerable. I said I'd take her. We named her Mocha. She weighed only four pounds. **Her body and spirit were in bad shape.** Her teeth looked like concrete. There wasn't enough room in her mouth for her tongue, so it stuck out all the time.



We took Mocha to the vet. She went onto antibiotics, tested positive for feline herpes, and had to have all but two of her teeth pulled. A few months later, **she got so sick**, we had to take her to an ER vet and they put her on a feeding tube and gave her a steroid shot. After a couple of days, the vet said there was **nothing else he could do.** He didn't think she would make it and suggested we take her home and make her as comfortable as possible.

We took a week off work to care for Mocha, and our little girl started improving. She reached six pounds and grew interested in the world around her. She started to play with our other cats.

I don't know what Mocha's life was like before she came to us — something awful had happened to her. But now she's a happy, clumsy, playful, loving part of our family. **She brings us joy** and makes us laugh even after the hardest day at work. I'm so thankful I found out about her and she didn't die afraid and alone at the end of a needle. She's ours and we're hers. — Kris Richardson
